GARY COLEMAN'S estranged parents abandoned their effort to bury him in his native Illinois Friday after a Utah attorney revealed the actor named an executor in a 1999 will. Salt Lake City attorney Kent Alderman said he has a will Coleman wrote that he will take to a Utah County court sometime next week. The will was written before Coleman moved to Utah and met his future wife during filming for the 2006 comedy "Church Ball." Alderman wouldn't reveal details of the will, including the name of the executor. Coleman died May 28 in Utah from a brain hemorrhage at age 42.



JOSEPH STRICK, an independent filmmaker who brought James Joyce's "Ulysses" to the big screen and won an Academy Award for best documentary short subject for "Interviews With My Lai Veterans," has died. He was 86. Strick died of congestive heart failure Tuesday in a hospital in Paris.

CHACE CRAWFORD faces a marijuana possession charge after being arrested in the Dallas suburb of Plano. Police spokesman Rick McDonald says the 24-year-old "Gossip Girl" heartthrob was arrested in a parked vehicle early Friday morning. He was booked and later released on a misdemeanor charge of possessing less than 2 ounces of marijuana.



RICHARD DUNN, a longtime character actor who frequently collaborated with comics Tim Heidecker and Eric Wareheim, died Friday. He was 73. His agent, William Kerwin, says Dunn had been unconscious at a Hollywood hospital since Sunday. Kerwin didn't immediately know the cause of death. The lanky, bespectacled actor often appeared on "Tim and Eric Awesome Show, Great Job!" on the Cartoon Network.

1 Hunt for wolves in Foothills suspended

BOISE — The two wolves are suspected of killing 13 sheep in the Hulls Gulch area last month. Other sheep have since been moved out of the area and none have been killed since May 24, according to George Graves, assistant state director for Wildlife Services.

Graves said the hunt will resume if more sheep are killed or shepherds see or hear wolves in the area.

2 Minnick's line-item veto bill is a PR ploy, Labrador says

BOISE — First District Republican congressional nominee Raul Labrador said replacing House Speaker Nancy Pelosi with a Republican is the most important step to end deficit spending.

"I recognize the public relations value of (Democrat Walt Minnick's) claims, particularly this close to a tough election. But the simple fact is, the only thing that is going to stop this horrendous flow of red ink is a change in political leadership."

In March, Minnick introduced H.R. 4921, which would allow the president to submit a list of spending cuts in appropriations bills and require an up-or-down vote in the House and Senate.

Last week, the White House and House Budget Committee Chairman John Spratt, D-S.C., endorsed Minnick's idea, which is incorporated in H.R. 5454.

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3 Man sold meth out of a storage unit, police say

BOISE — Ted Bruce is charged with possession of methamphetamine with intent to deliver and being a felon in the possession of a firearm.

Officers found about 6.5 grams of methamphetamine, digital scales, packaging materials and two rifles in a storage unit in the 400 block of South Maple Grove Road on Thursday, according to police reports.

Bruce, 49, has a previous felony conviction for possession of a controlled substance from 2002, according to court records.

4 Tax collectors want \$11 million to cover refunds

BOISE — The Board of Examiners, which includes Gov. Butch Otter, will meet Tuesday on the request to transfer the money from the state general fund.

It comes after two similar transfers since March — totaling \$45 million — that were needed because monthly tax collections trail forecasts and have failed to restock Idaho's refund account quickly enough to pay those due money.

The transfers have helped avoid refund delays, but they underscore the possibility that Idaho will have to tap reserves or find

6 Victims decry payments to defrocked priest

STOCKTON, Calif. — A man who admitted molesting at least 25 children is due to begin receiving money each month from an annuity purchased by the Stockton Diocese

when he turns 65 on Saturday.

The payments, which will total more than \$94,560 over 10 years — about \$788 a month — have outraged abuse victims who said Oliver O'Grady shouldn't be rewarded, and any funds should go to victims' assistance programs.

Bishop Stephen Blaire, who arranged the annuity, said it was part of a deal to ensure that O'Grady left the priesthood. Blaire said he recognized the payments would be received poorly, "but there was a reason."

O'Grady was convicted in 1994 of molesting two brothers between 1978 and 1991. He served almost seven years in prison then was deported to his native Ireland.

The former priest was the subject of an award-winning 2006 documentary, "Deliver Us from Evil," in which he spoke openly of abusing more than 20 children. His case has cost the Stockton diocese millions of dollars to settle sexual abuse lawsuits.

WASHINGTON — That's the word that propelled 14-year-old Anamika Veeramani, left, of North Royalton, Ohio, to victory Friday night at the 83rd Scripps National Spelling Bee.

Anamika will receive more than \$40,000 in cash and prizes — and, of course, the huge winner's trophy.

Anamika is the third consecutive Indian-American bee champion, and the eighth in the last 12 years. It's a run that began when Nupur Lala won in 1999 and was featured in the documentary "Spellbound."
